World conflict and instability

Over the last few years, the world has become increasingly volatile and dangerous. Risks to our security, prosperity and values are on the rise and the war, which Russia brought to Ukraine and Europe, continues to rage.


Within two years, Russia could pose a credible threat to one or several NATO countries if the Alliance does not build up its military power at an equal pace. Our supply lines, military equipment and capabilities need to be future-proofed, and dramatically increase in scale and impact, if they are to be a credible deterrent.



Systemic challenges

Within the Ministry of Defence (MOD) we are delivering well. Our organisations are under mounting pressure to deliver exceptional, mission-critical results. While successes have been achieved, our true potential has been limited by our segmented organisational structures, fragmented approaches and competing priorities.

This, often siloed, approach has bred duplication of effort, restricted synergy and collaboration, and hindered UK Defence's ability to integrate technologies and exploit innovation. It has not only impeded progress and efficiencies but also fostered frustration among our people who are passionate about delivering for our armed forces.



A new era for UK Defence

The Defence Reform programme has streamlined our complex systems and structures, consolidating all of UK Defence into four parts, each with distinct responsibilities and single points of accountability.

This is the largest programme of reform in over 50 years, creating a more integrated defence system with a central control function overseeing our vast structure.

The **Department of State** provides clear policy and strategic direction within the MOD to facilitate tangible outcomes and successful delivery. The **Military Strategic Headquarters** drives greater collaboration within the UK Armed Forces by fostering an 'integrated' force across the maritime, air, land, cyber and space domains. And the **Defence Nuclear Enterprise** manages, operates and sustains the UK's nuclear deterrent.



A new era for UK Defence

The **National Armaments Director Group** unites the science, technology, procurement and support organisations responsible for developing, sustaining and delivering the UK's national arsenal. This ensures greater control over our defence development and acquisition structure, with simplified reporting lines, better coordination and less duplication of effort. It enables a greater focus on industry partnership, international collaboration and export opportunities.

A more cohesive and aligned leadership structure, with a sharper focus on outcomes, allows us to expedite decision-making processes, ensuring swifter delivery and better value for money.



One group, many strengths

The organisations that form the National Armaments Director Group are, for the first time, acting as one. Harnessing and leveraging their collective intelligence, resources, insights, skills and capabilities to add value across every aspect of defence acquisition and delivery.


Simplifying the structure

To allow defence to be more agile, cohered and integrated, our complex system has been simplified.

Defence is now structured into four groups, each with responsibilities and single points of accountability.

This new approach will create a defence centre which will enable us to:

- focus on outcomes
- speed up decision making
- secure faster delivery
- achieve the best value for money for taxpayers



The National Armaments Director Group

Led by the National Armaments Director, the National Armaments Director Group brings together the UK's defence acquisition, science, technology, infrastructure, procurement, export and support organisations.

It unites MOD organisations responsible for developing, delivering sustaining, housing and harbouring the UK's 'national arsenal' and defence estate.

The group brings together eight separate procurement budgets into one, with an initial operating budget of over £5Bn, which will grow as the financial restructuring of the Department continues.



The NAD Group Mission


Maximising our war-fighters' collective ability to operate, deter, fight and win.

This is supported by four strategic outcomes:


- **1. Build a competitive armaments ecosystem** by creating the conditions for a productive, adaptable and survivable military-industrial-tech enterprise with international allies.
